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
PANDEMIC PIVOTING

Two weeks before Covid-19 made its way to Cincinnati that we had to cancel our Spring 2020 trip to Kampala. With borders closing and travel becoming increasingly unpredictable, we made this difficult decision not realizing that it would be two years before we would see our friends and colleagues again. However, with international travel at a halt, our organization began to explore ways to continue our contributions through our partnership with Dr. Jeff Otiti and and by establishing new local service opportunities.

Medwish is an organization that collects unused and non-expired medical goods and equipment from around the US and then sorts them for organizations like HNO that can use them for international service. During out hiatus, HNO was able to partner with Medwish to ship several pallets of necessary equipment to help continue to support Dr. Otiti's work in Uganda. Some of the equipment included an anesthesia machine, light sources, exam chairs, and microscope.

On the local level, HNO facilitated small teams of individuals to work at Cincinnati Freestore Foodback to prepare distribution boxes for those in need.







SPRING HIGHLIGHTS

We finally arrived back in Kampala on May 14, 2022. It felt surreal to be back and to have been away for so long. We were greeted by some familiar faces like Edward, our driver, who picked us up from the airport. We were also introduced to new ones like Gerty, our cook at the guest house. It was a short trip but packed from start to finish with taking care of patients, some of whom had waited years for our return.

One such patient was Zahara. She had a tracheostomy and was breathing through a tube that was placed in her neck as a result of an accident. With the tracheostomy, she could not speak without covering her tube. However, with a tracheal reconstruction, she could have the tube removed and would be able to communicate normally again.

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In the fall of 2019, we had given her a slip of paper with the date we would return in March 2020 for her surgery. She waited for two and a half years until she could speak . Finally, on May 18, 2022, she spoke for the first time since her accident. She cried with joy and her family cried with her.

Meanwhile, our team was acutely aware that others could not wait. As time between our camps had grown so had the suffering of individuals not able to have surgery. The overwhelming turn out of patients who needed surgery at this camp in particular was sobering. It reminded each of our participants, both new and veteran, of why we continue the work of global outreach and education.









FALL HIGHLIGHTS

Unfortunately, just weeks before our planned departure, Uganda experienced an outbreak of the Sudan Ebola virus disrupting initially just our location. We quickly made alternate plans to work in Kampala, but as the weeks passed, it became clear that travel to Uganda would not be wise.



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Fortunately, Dr. Zender's mentor, Dr. James Netterville from Vanderbilt University, had been planning an overlapping trip to Malindi, Kenya. Combining their resources, the two teams were able to join efforts. HNO team met with Dr. Netterville's team for their second week and working together, delivered care to approximately 30 additional patients at Tawfiq Hospital. We were fortunate to be able to serve alongside of such a wonderful group to help so many in need.
